

The Pastor's Letter



This month of November began with the Solemnity of All Saints. We are currently in the midst of our nine-day All Souls Day Novena (if you still wish to enroll your loved ones, please return the envelopes with their name as soon as possible). Throughout this month we especially remember to pray for the souls of the faithful departed, visit cemeteries, and obtain indulgences for their souls.

Over the course of the next few weeks, I would like for us to consider just what we mean and what we do at our Catholic funeral liturgies. Our funeral rites are

celebrated according to the *Order of Christian Funerals*. Our Catholic funeral rites are broken into three parts or stages: The Vigil (or wake), the Funeral Mass, and the Committal. Each of these three parts has its own meaning theologically and liturgically, as well as psychologically and emotionally. The three together express our faith and hope in the resurrection of the dead, pray for the soul of our deceased loved one, as well as provide effective means of comfort and mourning.

The General Introduction to the *Order of Christian Funerals* states the following, "At the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of baptism and strengthened at the Eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end nor does it break the bonds forged in this life. The Church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting word of God and the sacrament of the Eucharist" (OCF 4). Our funeral rites are primarily focused on prayer for the deceased because of our hope in God and our belief in the resurrection of the dead (as we profess in the Creed). Secondary, but nonetheless very important aspects, are the comfort of the family and friends with Scripture and Sacrament.

Although the OCF provides prayers and rites for several other moments, the rite has three principal parts. The first of these is the Vigil, or wake. "At the vigil the Christian community keeps watch with the family in prayer to the God of mercy and finds strength in Christ's presence. It is the first occasion among the funeral rites for the solemn reading of the word of God. In this time of loss the family and community turn to God's word as the source of faith and hope, as light and life in the face of darkness and death" (OCF 56). The Vigil serves an important purpose as the beginning for formal prayer and rites, as well as the time for the family to meet and receive the comfort of family and friends. It is the appropriate time for the sharing of memories, telling of stories, display of photographs and memories. *The Vigil or wake is the appropriate time for a eulogy, not the funeral Mass.*

The wake serves an important function for prayer as well as for our emotional and psychological grieving and healing. When there is no wake, there is a tendency to want to place aspects of the wake into the funeral Mass, when they are less appropriate or not appropriate at all. Next week we will focus on the second part of our funeral rites, the funeral Mass.

Please join us this Saturday, November 9, at 9am for our annual Mass of Remembrance. At this Mass we gather with the family and friends of those who have died from our parish over the past year. We continue to pray for their souls and comfort their families.

The gates may be locked as early as 8AM to as late as 9PM depending on the following schedule.



SAINT MARTIN OF TOURS COAT DRIVE NOVEMBER 9th <u>& 10th, 2019</u>



The Story of St. Martin of Tours and why our Knights of Columbus, M.J. HARTIGAN COUNCIL 5033, sponsors a Coat Drive:

Martin was born of pagan parents in what is now Hungary in circa 316 AD and grew up in Italy. His father was a tribune in the Imperial Horse Guard. Martin was forced at the age of 15 to serve in the cavalry corps of the Roman military as his father. By the time he was 18, Martin is believed to have served in Gaul, and eventually Milan and Treves. Scholars think he served as part of the emperor's guard.

As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens, France. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Jesus spoke to him while wearing the torn cloak he had given him. When he awoke, the garment was restored. Moved by this vision and apparent miracle, Martin immediately finished his religious instruction and was baptized at the age of 18.

On leaving the Roman army, Martin settled at Poitiers, under the guidance of Bishop Hilary. He became a missionary in the provinces of Pannonia and Illyricum (now in the Balkan Peninsula), where he opposed Arianism, a heresy that denied the divinity of Christ. In 360, he rejoined Hilary at Poitiers.



Martin then founded a community of hermits at Ligugé, the first monastery in Gaul. In 371 he was made Bishop of Tours, and outside that city he founded another monastery, Marmoutier, to which he withdrew whenever possible.

As Bishop, Martin made Marmoutier a great monastic complex to which European ascetics were attracted and from which apostles spread Christianity throughout Gaul. He himself was an active missionary in Touraine and in the country districts where Christianity was as yet barely known.

He passed away in 397 AD. During his lifetime, Martin acquired a reputation as a miracle worker, and he was one of the first non-martyrs to be publicly venerated as a saint.



The Life Center is celebrating 33 years as a non-profit 501c3, operating centers throughout Long Island known as "AAA Pregnancy Options." They have a crisis pregnancy center in Massapequa, Deer Park and Hempstead. Each month they counsel over 300 women and men and field over 2,500 phone calls and are sustained fully through donations. The primary focus is to educate those facing an unplanned pregnancy, fetal development and the numerous resources available to help


them make informed and empowered decisions - hopefully choosing life for their baby!

ALL SERVICES ARE FREE! We provide pregnancy test kits, sonograms, referrals in collaboration with the Gianna Center of Long Island and Catholic Health Services, maternity housing referrals that meet certain criteria, parenting and life skills workshops and many more resources. EVERY NEW MOTHER AND FATHER WHO CHOOSES LIFE FOR THEIR BABY AND HAS NOTHING, NEEDS EVERYTHING! Our support continues after the baby is born: We provide essential materials such as diapers, wipes, baby clothes, cribs, car seats, strollers, etc. until the baby is two years old. Last year we distributed the equivalent of \$826,000 of baby items to over 2,800 moms and dads from our local communities. CLOSE TO A MILLION DOLLARS DISTRIBUT-ED. We have implemented an extremely effective men's program called PROJECT BLUEPRINT and currently have 8 male volunteers, one of which is Lou Fielack, our own parishioner. They speak with the father about the humanity of their baby; educating him on manhood and fatherhood and encourage him to support his wife or girlfriend to choose life for their baby. Within the last 12 months, we have spoken with 53 male clients and over 30 of these have resulted in saved babies. The Life Center saves lives by changing hearts. In the last 2 years, we have saved the lives of 153 babies resulting in sparing families the physical, emotional and spiritual anguish had a different decision been made. The words of our beloved Saint John Paul II will always ring true, *"In the name of God, Respect, Protect, Love and Serve Life, every Human Life."*

On a special note, I was unable to speak at the masses due to health reasons. I would like to thank Father Chris for his generosity and commitment to all life issues and inviting us to speak to you. I would like to give special thanks to George Lucas, who set up the all the crates before the masses. Our committee volunteers, Pat and Bill Rochford, Mary Ellen Walsh, Sheila Regan, all other members who helped hand out bottles, and our faithful ushers who are always there to help. Special thanks to my husband Jerry, who took to the podium for four masses, and finally, my daughter Colleen and my son-in-law, Denis who spoke at the 5:30 mass on Sunday.
