



A CHRISTMAS CAROL



This Charles Dickens' classic is a compelling tale of greed, love and charity featuring *Ebenezer Scrooge*, a man of business who has no use for Christmas. Throughout the story, three ghosts visit him representing his past, present and what might be. Dickens was sending a message to his readers that Christmas is the time of year where *everyone* has the right to rejoice and be happy. He was trying to make a statement that we should *all* enjoy life because we have only *one* chance to live it.

During Victorian times, London became a center for poverty, crime and pollution. Dickens was outraged at the conditions in which the working class lived. He wanted to draw attention to these atrocities to the upper-class. This is the reason Dickens wrote novels with a social conscience so as to raise public awareness of these situations. In "A Christmas Carol," Dickens portrays Scrooge as a very unpleasant and miserly man. He describes him as a tight fisted, nose-to-the-grindstone character. This paints a picture of a stingy old man obsessed with money and work. From the very beginning, the author wants the reader to see just how awful a human being Scrooge is. Dickens says he is a sinner, behaving selfishly and hinting that he is evil!

Each of the ghosts that visited him on the Eve of Christmas, journeyed to other parts of his life - the past, the present and the future. He is made to realize how he became such a miserable person. The Ghost of Christmas Past shows him as a child, unloved and dismissed by a parent. Then he sees himself letting go of Belle, his young love. Because of the success he was enjoying, all he can see now is her poverty - not the kind of wife he is suited for. The Ghost of Christmas Present, opens his eyes to the great hardships of the average person living in London. He visits the home of his *Clark*, who he pays a meager salary. Bob Cratchit has a wife and five children to support. His youngest, Tiny Tim, is a very sick child. He is the selfless child, innocent, and accepting of his small world, for it is filled with love and caring. And finally, the Ghost of Christmas Future, where the Grim Reaper brings him to a cemetery, unvisited, unknowing, and uncaring of the life of the name on the tombstone - *Ebenezer Scrooge*.

The beauty of this classic story is redemption. He finally sees how his life has affected others by his ignorance and greed. He now understands how he has missed the true beauty of love and reaching out to others. At the close of this wonderful story, Scrooge says, "I will live in the past, the present and the future. The Ghosts of all Three shall strive within me. I will not shut out the lessons that they teach." Here, he shows repentance and remorse at his previous life and vows to live every day for the present and to honor Christmas always. Dickens was trying to convey the fact that no one is completely evil and that everyone has some good in them which they will discover by looking inside themselves. A Christmas Carol appeals to the social consciousness of all of us, and it makes us actually stop and think about the world today. It will still be relevant another hundred years from today as there will always be the problem of social division. Dickens was not writing just for the audience of his era, but for every person in every time. Maybe he knew it would still have relevance today.

The book is a quick read, and the play can be seen at Theater Three in Port Jefferson through New Year's. Christmas is a wonderful time to stop and find out where our paths are leading us. Time to reach out and share whatever it is we may have. And to remember, as Tiny Time proclaimed, "God Bless Us, Everyone!





If you're reading this, you lived to see the new year. This is no small matter! Your life makes a difference in the universe, whether or not you embrace your God-given power. May this prayer accompany your initial steps into the future.

God of all time, help us enter the New Year quietly, thoughtful of who we are to ourselves and to others, mindful that our steps make an impact and our words carry power. May we walk gently. May we speak only after we have listened well. Creator of all life, help us enter the New Year reverently, aware that you have endowed every creature and plant, every person and habitat with beauty and purpose. May we regard the world with tenderness. May we honor rather than destroy. Lover of all souls, help us enter the New Year joyfully, willing to laugh and dance and dream, remembering our many gifts with thanks and looking forward to blessings yet to come. May we welcome your lavish love. May we cast off the small, vindictive god our fears have made. May the grace and peace of Christ bless you now and in the days ahead.
