The Pastor's Letter

Today, the Lectionary presents us with the beautiful Gospel of the two disciples walking on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus. This is on the day of the Resurrection itself. Cleopas and the unnamed disciple are downcast, walking away from the scene of the Crucifixion into the unknown. These are men of faith who have had that faith shaken. They are men of hope but have had that hope severely damaged. They are trying to make sense of the events of the recent past, and trying to figure out what to do in the immediate future.

In many ways, we are like those disciples. We find ourselves in a great unknown. That which we knew, and took for granted, is no longer here (at least temporarily). We don't know of a final date for all of the restrictions. So, we are people of faith and hope, but perhaps that faith and hope are shaken or damaged a bit? To us here and now, like Cleopas and the other disciple on the day of the Resurrection, Jesus approaches. He walks with us. The disciples, although they might have felt abandoned, are still in the presence of Jesus. When we pray over the words of this Gospel, we see how they are lived out at each and every Mass. The people are gathered together, the Scriptures are read and broken open, and Christ comes in a real and true way in the Breaking of the Bread. And then immediately after, we are dismissed to go and bear witness!

Although not in ordinary times, and sadly not able to gather together Sunday and Sunday for the Eucharist, we are not abandoned. In the home, the Domestic Church, you are still gathered together. We are still able to read, pray with, and break open the Scriptures. There are some great resources out there and many are being provided to us free of charge in these days. So perhaps we are actually able to spend more time with the Word of God now than in the immediate past? Although not able to receive the Eucharist, Christ is still really present in the Tabernacle. The Church is open from 8am to 8pm daily for quiet prayer in the Presence of the Lord. No, this does not and cannot replace the Mass. But our prayer before the Lord sustains us from Mass to Mass. It is a continuation of the graces of Mass and leads us, calls us towards the next Mass. This is true each week from Sunday to Sunday. In our present situation the time from "Sunday to Sunday" is a bit longer. But the reality remains.

The Mass is still being celebrated in our parish and in every parish. Each and every Mass, whether it is the priest alone or millions of people gathered with the Holy Father, is a communal celebration. It is the gathering of the Communion of Saints, the Church on earth and in heaven. Like Cleopas and the other disciple, we are all walking in this together. And we are walking into an unknown, at least in terms of immediate details. We already know the final outcome-Jesus Christ comes again! We need to pray for the graces of generosity, humility, prudence, and patience. Many people have creative ideas about things in the parish, the community, the schools, and the like. Some are good and we try to implement them. Some are good but cannot be done for logistical reasons. Some may be good but would go against directives from the Diocese. And some would not be good ideas in the present environment. In other words, we are listening, evaluating, and making decisions as we go forward in this very fluid environment. Some things that may be good for school class groups or even other parishes might not be good for our parish, or not logistically possible at this time.

It's in these times that we return to the basics: love of God and love of neighbor. Like Cleopas and the other disciple, let's turn to the Scriptures for comfort. Take extra time to pray the readings of the Mass. Start reading the Gospels, just a chapter a day, each day. Develop an appreciation and habit of praying the Liturgy of the Hours. This is the official prayer of the Church, sanctifying the days and the hours. When you pray the Liturgy of the Hours you are not just watching something virtually, but really and truly participating in the official liturgy of the Church. The "ibreviary" app is a great, easy, and free resource for this!

Finally, please download and monitor the Parish App! It will have the latest details as well as many resources to live out your faith in these days!

Do you have a spare iPad or iPhone that you could donate to those patients who are hoping to speak to and see the faces of their loved ones?

If you think social distancing is hard, imagine being a patient admitted to the hospital in isolation. When people are sick, the love of their families and friends can make them feel better than any medicine ever could. Unfortunately, that's not possible right now with the current visitor regulations. For patients, the hospital staff may be the last ones to hold their hands and tell them they are loved as they leave this world to move on to eternal life.

We at St. Martins Parish would like to organize a virtual visitation initiative with iPads / iPhones to help patients connect with their families when they are hospitalized. If you have an old iPad / iPhone (or even new!) please consider donating it for patient usage at the hospitals of Northwell Health in a program called We Care 4 Them.

If you can help, here is what we ask you to do:

- Insure your IPHONE / IPAD has the ability to do FaceTime....how do you know? Go to SETTINGS and scroll down until you see
 FaceTime between Messages and Maps. If you see it, it means your device can do FaceTime.
- Please sign out from your iCloud account before completing a factory reset by going to SETTINGS > Accounts & Passwords > Sign
 Out
- Then please erase all data on your phone. This is simple. Go to SETTINGS. Then to the GENERAL tab. Click on it and scroll all the
 way down to RESET. Then click on ERASE ALL SETTINGS. It may ask for your password.
- Please Place your donation, including charger cables if possible, in a plastic bag and if you like, include your contact information,
 then bring your donation to the Rectory and place in the Mail Slot in the door. Please do not ring the door bell, the Rectory office is
 closed due to the quarantine.
- When you drop off we would appreciate a message on our Facebook page or the APP so we know to expect it.
- We will then collect the donated devices and turn them over to Northwell for distribution throughout the needed floors for
 patients to start using them to communicate with their families.

The Parish of St. Martin of Tours and the staff of Northwell Health thank you for your generous assistance as we strive to help those in need during this sad and emotionally stressfultime.

Prayer is more important now than ever. Spend some quiet time with God. He's waiting to hear from you. And He wants you to listen to Him.



and the comfort of your healing presence.


May their caregivers, families and neighbors be shielded from the onslaught of the virus. Give solace to those who grieve the loss of loved ones.

Protect and guide those who strive to find a cure,



Catholic Health Services teams up with Mayo Clinic for COVID-19 plasma research

Potential donors must have a prior, verified diagnosis of COVID-19, but are now symptom-free and fully recovered. In addition to being in good health, donors must also be at least 18 years of age and weigh at least 110 pounds. The plasma can be administered only to a consenting COVID-19 patient or a patient whose family member offers consent. The treatment will be given to those patients judged by a physician to be at high risk of disease progression to severe or life-threatening. Why is this pandemic, or any disaster, such an opportunity for scammers and criminals?

A: Unfortunately, criminals are very opportunistic. They see a vulnerable population out there that they can prey upon. People are scared and looking for help. People are trying to protect themselves and their families. For example, people are looking for medical attention and medical equipment. They also may be unemployed and looking for work. There may be an extra level of desperation right now that may cause someone to make an emotional decision that could make them a victim.

Q: What are some of the most common fraud schemes you're seeing?

A: Government Impersonators

One of the most prevalent schemes we're seeing is government impersonators. Criminals are reaching out to people through social media, emails, or phone calls pretending to be from the government. In some cases, they're even going door-to-door to try to convince someone that they need to provide money for COVID testing, financial relief, or medical equipment.

We are a very trusting society, but it's important to know that the government will not reach out to you this way. If someone reaches out to you directly and says they're from the government helping you with virus-related issues, it's likely a scam. This "government" representative may be trying to use phishing or other techniques to hack your computer or get your personal information or money.

Fraudulent Cures or Medical Equipment

Right now, the threat we're most concerned about is fake cures or treatments for the virus. These "cures" can be extremely dangerous to your health—even fatal. You should never accept a medical treatment or virus test from anyone other than your doctor, pharmacist, or local health department.

Work-from-Home Fraud

People who are at home and out of work are vulnerable to work-from-home scams. If someone you don't know contacts you and wants you to urgently pay them in return for a "job," you are dealing with a criminal. Legitimate jobs will not ask you to pay them. If you're in a role like this where you're being asked to send or move money, you're acting as a money mule, which is a federal crime.

Investment Fraud

One of the most lucrative schemes for criminals is offering you an opportunity to invest in a cure or treatment for the virus. The purpose of these get-rich-quick schemes is simply to defraud the investor. Any offer like this should be treated with extreme caution. Steven Merrill, chief, FBI Financial Crimes Section

Q: What potential scams should people be aware of regarding government financial benefits?

A: The government will not ask you for personal information to give you your financial benefits. If you receive an email, text message, or phone call claiming to help you get your benefits, do not respond. If you are eligible to receive the benefits, your government check will be mailed to you or will be direct deposited into your bank account. (Note: The IRS has additional tips on how to avoid these types of scams.)

Q: What is the FBI doing about these scammers?

A: We're investigating many of these cases right now. We've already arrested and filed charges against those who we have evidence to believe are engaging in these crimes. We have teams of FBI employees working these cases every day. I strongly encourage anyone who comes across something suspicious to report it to the FBI at <u>tips.fbi.gov</u> or to the Internet Crime Complaint Center at <u>ic3.gov</u>

Q: What can people do to protect themselves from scammers?

A: Use extreme caution in online communication. For emails, verify who the sender is—criminals will sometimes change just one letter in an email address to make it look like one you know. Be very wary of attachments or links; hover your mouse over a link before clicking to see where it's sending you.

In general, be suspicious of anyone offering you something that's "too good to be true" or is a secret investment opportunity or medical advice. Seek out legitimate sources of information.

How to Report Phishing

- 1. If you got a phishing email, forward it to the FTC at spam@uce.gov and to the Anti-Phishing Working Group at reportphishing@apwg.org. If you got a phishing text message, forward it to SPAM (7726).
- 2. Report the phishing attack to the FTC at ftc.gov/complaint.

THREE STATES' CORONAVIRUS ABORTION BANS REMAIN AFTER COURT INTERVENTIONS

Eight states that have enacted temporary bans on abortion during the coronavirus pandemic are contending with legal challenges, and judges have prevented many of the temporary bans from coming into effect. Judges have so far intervened to allow abortion in some form in Alabama, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Ohio, Iowa, Louisiana and Tennessee after the leaders of those states attempted to classify elective abortions as non-essential procedures. Many states have suspended medical procedures deemed non-emergency or non-essential in an attempt to stem the spread of the virus among healthcare professionals, and to free up medical resources and hospital capacity.

ELDERLY & DISABLED HAVE SAME RIGHT TO TREATMENT AS OTHERS, SAY BISHOPS

Elderly and disabled coronavirus patients have the same right to life-prolonging treatments as others, the bishops of England and Wales have said. "With escalation of the coronavirus, demand on NHS resources is outstripping supply and those responsible for our care and well-being are facing challenging decisions," they said. "Nevertheless, doctors struggling with scarce resources must never decide against treating patients based on factors such as disability or age. A decision against offering a certain life-prolonging treatment to an individual must never be a judgment based on the worthwhileness of that person's life, including their age or other social characteristics, but a pragmatic decision about the likelihood of him/her benefiting from the intervention given their medical condition."

PRO-LIFE LEADERS CALL FOR CORONAVIRUS VACCINE WITHOUT ABORTION TIES

Development of an effective, safe and widely available vaccine for the novel coronavirus is deeply important, but its development should avoid unethical links to abortion, said pro-life leaders in a letter to the Trump Administration. "It is critically important that Americans have access to a vaccine that is produced ethically: no American should be forced to choose between being vaccinated against this potentially deadly virus and violating his or her conscience," said the April 17 letter to Dr. Stephen M. Hahn, commissioner of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.
