## The Pastor's Letter

This past Tuesday was the Memorial of Saint Peter Chanel, a Marist priest who became a missionary to



the Island of Futuna and the first martyr of Oceania. In the Office of Readings for his memorial we find these words, "Quietly he preached the Gospel, but there was little response." Still with invincible perseverance he pursued his missionary task on both the human and religious level, relying on the example and words of Christ: There is one who sows and another who reaps...The blood of this martyr benefited, in the first place, the natives of Futuna, for a few years later they were all converted to the faith of Christ. But it benefited as well the other islands of Oceania, where Christian churches, which claim Peter as their first martyr, are

now flourishing. Saint Peter Chanel died in 1841.

I bring this up because today, the Fourth Sunday of Easter, is "Good Shepherd Sunday." Each year on this date our readings give us one of the many images of Christ as shepherd. This Sunday is normally observed as one of special prayer for vocations to the priesthood. Often priests would share their own "vocation story" at Mass or there might be some words from a seminarian following the Prayer after Communion. Obviously, we can't do those things this year. But in a way those presentations are more profound in 2020.

Because of the internet and technology, we can see the work done by so many in parishes in our Diocese and around the world. While things that work at one parish might not work at another, we see the creativity of the Holy Spirit working through our priests and others in parishes. Like all of us, this is a new experience in living as a Catholic and as a parishioner. We haven't been here before and Godwilling we won't be here again. But here we are. Your priests here and in all parishes are still celebrating the Eucharist daily with and for the people of God. Even a priest praying the Mass "alone" in a private rectory chapel is the offering of the entirety of the Church-on earth and in heaven. Priests are still going out and administering the sacraments of the Sick and Penance. The particulars have changed in many cases, but the essentials remain the same.

One of the hardest parts of this crisis for myself, and for other priests I talk to, is that "best practices" today are in many cases the exact opposite of our instincts. Today, we are trying to be creative in ministering in ways that purposely do not gather people together! Imagine saying that six months ago! As hard as it is for you not to gather as a community, it is hard for us. I am used to being in the confessional almost every day of the week and encouraging frequent confession. We have not been able to use our confessional for almost two months. In our new world, pastors and parish leaders have to make the best decisions they can based on the facts out there and the best guesses of the "experts." We know that almost any major decision made will be loved by some and hated by others. For example, do we keep the church building open? There are strong opinions on both sides. In a way, that is good. It means that people are taking their faith seriously. It would be much worse if no one cared whether the building was open or not!

Over the history of the Church, times of great challenge and persecution have led to a subsequent blossoming of vocations to the priesthood and to "great awakenings" in the faith of the people. Godwilling, this will happen to us at Saint Martins, in the Diocese of Rockville Centre, and the Universal Church. Remember, we are all in this together and we should use this situation as a means to grow in holiness, not just to waste away our days on Netflix. In describing his mission to a fellow religious, St. Peter Chanel said, "In such as difficult mission, one has to be holy." One grace from this time, for priests and for all, is that it provides an opportunity to reset the balance active/contemplative balance in our spirituality. For those of us who are so used to "doing," this is a time to slow down and focus on our relationship with God in prayer, Scripture study and Lectio Divina, good spiritual reading, and contemplative prayer.

Next Sunday is Mother's Day. You can't go out for brunch but you can support our local businesses! Remember these are the ones who support your fundraisers with gift certificates and gift baskets all year long! The priests of the parish will still pray a Mother's Day Novena of 9 days of Masses for those whom you wish to enroll, living and deceased. Please return the envelopes with the names clearly indicated as your convenience. You may also feel more comfortable emailing me the names you wish to enroll (fathercostigan@gmail.com). You can then drop or mail the envelopes at your convenience but the names will be included in the Masses.

begin to imagine. He calls us to repentance and true love with Him.


### Living Stewardship ~ Pillar of Service:

### **FORMED**

Sigrid Undset's Catherine of Siena is critically acclaimed as one of the best biographies of this well-known and amazing fourteenth-century saint. Known for her historical fiction, which won her the Nobel Prize for literature in 1928, Undset based this factual work on primary sources, her own experiences living in Italy, and her profound understanding of the human heart. One of the greatest novelists of the twentieth century, Undset was no stranger to hagiography (A hagiography is a biography of a saint or an ecclesiastical leader, and by extension, a praised and idealized biography of a founder, saint, monk, nun or icon in any of the world's religions.)

Her meticulous research of medieval times, which bore

such fruit in her multi-volume masterpieces *Kristin Lavransdatter* and *The Master of Hestviken*, acquainted her with some of the holy men and women produced by the Age of Faith. Their exemplary lives left a deep impression upon the author, an impression Undset credited as one of her reasons for entering the Church in 1924. Catherine of Siena was a particular favorite of Undset, who also was a Third Order Dominican. An extraordinarily active, intelligent, and courageous woman, Catherine at an early age devoted herself to the love of God. The intensity of her prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor won her a reputation for holiness and wisdom, and she was called upon to make peace between warring nobles. Believing that peace in Italy could be achieved only if the Pope, then living in France, returned to Rome, Catherine boldly traveled to Avignon to meet with Pope Gregory XI. With sensitivity to the zealous love of God and man that permeated the life of Saint Catherine, Undset presents a most moving and memorable portrait of one of the greatest women of all time.

May those who are infected receive the proper treatment and the comfort of your healing presence.


May their caregivers, families and neighbors be shielded from the onslaught of the virus. Give solace to those who grieve the loss of loved ones.

# St. Martin of Tours Partners in Mission working with Northwell Health Do you have a spare iPad, iPhone or similar device that you could donate to hospitalized patients who are hoping to speak to and see the faces of their loved ones?

If you think social distancing is hard, imagine being a patient admitted to the hospital in isolation. Unfortunately, current visitor regulations do not allow for the presence of families and friends. In many instances, hospital staff may be the last ones to hold the hands of a patient and tell them they are loved as they leave this world to move on to eternal life.

St. Martin's Parish is organizing a virtual visitation initiative via the use of donated iPads, iPhones and other similar devices to help patients connect with their families and friends when they are hospitalized. If you have an old device (or new!), please consider donating it for patient usage at the hospitals of Northwell Health in a program called We Care 4 Them.

### If you can help, here is what we ask you to do:

- \* Insure your IPHONE/IPAD has the ability to do FaceTime. Go to SETTINGS and scroll down until you see FaceTime between Messages and Maps. If you see it, it means your device can do FaceTime.
- \* Sign out from your iCloud account before completing a factory reset by going to SETTINGS > Accounts & Passwords > Sign Out.
- \* Erase all data on your phone. Go to SETTINGS. Then to the GENERAL tab. Click on it and scroll all the way down to RESET. Then click on ERASE ALL SETTINGS. It may ask for your password.
- \* Place your donation, including charger cables, in a plastic bag. Do include your contact information. Bring your donation to St. Martin of Tours Rectory, 40 Seaman Avenue, Bethpage, and place it in the mail slot in the door.
- \* We would appreciate a message at smtpartnersinmission@gmail.com so we know to expect it.
- \* Donated devices will be given to Northwell Health for distribution throughout their hospital system for patients to communicate with their families.



Potential donors must have a prior, verified diagnosis of COVID-19, but are now symptom-free and fully recovered. In addition to being in good health, donors must also be at least 18 years of age and weigh at least 110 pounds. The plasma can be administered only to a consenting COVID-19 patient or a patient whose family member offers consent. Vatican City, April 28, 2020 MT (CNA) Pope Francis prayed that Christians would respond to the lifting of lock-down restrictions with "prudence and obedience" as he celebrated Mass Tuesday. He said, "At this time, when indications have been given to exit out of quarantine, we pray the Lord will grant to His people, all of us, the grace of prudence and obedience to these indications, so that the pandemic does not return."

### Bishop Barres' letter of April 26th reads in part:

The Diocese of Rockville Centre is responding to the needs of Long Islanders both physically and spiritually, in a multitude of ways. One important element I would like to highlight in our Catholic community's frontline response to the coronavirus pandemic is our Catholic Home Care. Part of the Catholic Health Services of Long Island, Catholic Home Care is working harder than ever during this crisis. On most days, it now serves more than 3,000 patients in their own homes.

An increasing percentage of these visits are related to COVID-19 illness. As you can imagine, Catholic Home Care clinicians are operating under extraordinary circumstances as they perform the necessary visiting nurse calls; physical and occupational therapy visits; medical social services counseling sessions; and home health aide services in patients' homes. Despite the challenges, the 650 dedicated professionals and support staff of the Catholic Home Care team are working seven days a week to ensure every patient's home care needs are met.

Moreover, Catholic Home Care is innovating through the pandemic crisis to expand care through its Telehealth Program. Telehealth services are staffed by specially-trained clinicians, and patients are provided with telemonitoring devices to monitor their health multiple times each day.

Through Telehealth services, Catholic Home Care professionals partner with patients and their caregivers to take vitals such as a patient's heart rate, blood pressure, weight and oxygen saturation levels. This data is shared in real time with Catholic Home Care so that clinicians can provide enhanced feedback and services that meet the patient's day-to-day needs.

Catholic Home Care's Telehealth Program increases communication between patients, caregivers and clinicians. Telehealth keeps physicians better informed about patient progress and also educates patients to better understand and self-manage their health and wellness. It is just one of the ways Catholic Home Care is evolving to better meet patient needs in the home.
