The Pastor's Letter

oday's readings are very appropriate during this current time of pandemic. We are reminded that we are all "living stones" at a time when we cannot worship together within the "physical stones" of the church building. The "living stones" of the domestic church continue to announce the praising of him who

called us out of darkness into light! On our parish app, on the Facebook group, and in the bulletin you have been provided many different resources to live the faith as "living stones" within the stones and wood of your houses in the community.

Jesus reminds the apostles, "Do not let your hearts be troubled." We need to hear those words now, and always. Jesus remains the Way, the Truth, and the Life, during this unusual time in our history. Today as a nation we honor those mothers in our lives who have been there when our hearts were troubled to show us the way. All mothers, as well as our First Communicants, and all families are invited to receive Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament this afternoon from 1:30 to 2:00 in front of the church on Central Avenue. Please remain in your cars as you drive westbound from Seaman Avenue to Broadway.

We will begin our Mother's Day Novena of 9 days of Masses for our mothers living and deceased. Please return the special envelopes (or any envelope clearly marked "Mother's Day Novena) with the names you wish to enroll as soon as possible. You may also email me the names (fathercostigan@gmail.com) with "Mother's Day Novena" in the subject line. You could then mail or return the envelope at your convenience and as your circumstances allow.

Thank you to all who have continued your stewardship of the parish during this difficult time. Your generosity has allowed us a sense of continuity so that once we "return" we will not have to make any major changes. We are all in this together making sacrifices for OUR parish. Although we would have liked to have a more formal rollout for online giving, we have had a greater than anticipated response to VANCO. Please give serious consideration to switching to online giving not only during this time but into the future. It allows for safe and consistent support of the parish.

I would like to give you some updates on the Sacraments of Initiation here at SMT during this time.

REGARDING BAPTISM: like the other sacraments, baptisms are not currently being celebrated, outside of emergency situations. We thank all families for their understanding and generosity. When baptisms resume, it is likely they will be celebrated in small groups (just parents and godparents and immediate family). We will be as flexible as possible in scheduling and accommodate any reasonable request.

We are currently finalizing a process of Online Baptismal Preparation for those families who could not attend the Baptism Gatherings. You will be contacted in the near future. We also strongly encourage all families who are expecting a child or who have newborns to contact us. Although we cannot schedule a baptism, we can assist you in completing the pre-baptismal instruction now (especially while you may have extra time). This way there would be no delay in scheduling the baptism in the future. As always, please look at the requirements for baptism sponsors BEFORE asking anyone to be a sponsor!

REGARDING FIRST COMMUNION: May 2nd and 9th many of our younger Christians would have received Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist for the first time. These celebrations will be rescheduled in the future, although most likely in smaller groups. Our First Communicants are urged to pray prayers of Spiritual Communion each day and spend time before the Blessed Sacrament if you feel comfortable. Families of First Communicants (and anyone in the parish) are invited to come for "drive-by" Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament this coming Sunday, May 10, from 1:30 to 2:00 in front of the church on Central Avenue. Please remain in your car and drive West from Seaman Avenue toward Broadway.

REGARDING CONFIRMATION: We have received word that all confirmations with the bishops are cancelled for the rest of the calendar year 2020. This includes our rescheduled confirmation in June. Confirmations will be celebrated in the parish. More information to come.

Finally, as the weather is getting nicer, I would like to begin to go around the parish to bless houses (from the outside). To arrange for a house blessing, please <u>EMAIL</u> me (fathercostigan@gmail.com) with "House Blessing" in the subject line. Include your name, address, contact number, email, and the best day or time of day. Once I receive the requests I will put together a schedule and respond.




A Blessing for All Mothers

FORMED FOR ADULTS The 13th Day

In a world torn apart by persecution, war, and oppression, three children in Fatima, Portugal, were chosen by God to offer an urgent message of hope to the world.

Based on the memoirs of the oldest seer, Lucia Santos, and many thousands of independent eye-witness accounts, *The*

13th Day dramatizes the true story of three young shepherds who experienced six apparitions of Our Lady between May and October 1917, which culminated in the final prophesied Miracle of the Sun on October 13. Abducted from their homes, thrown into prison, and interrogated under the threat of death in the government's attempt to silence them, the children remained true to their story about the crucial messages from Mary of prayer, repentance, and conversion for the world.

Our Lady gave a secret to the children told in three parts, from a harrowing vision of hell, to prophetic warnings of future events including the advent and timing of the Second World War, the spread of Communism, and the attempted assassination of the Pope. This movie is not rated, but was created with an adult audience in mind. It may contain violence indicative of the life and times of the saint or character portrayed. We would recommend Parental Guidance and that parents preview it before watching with children.

St. Martin of Tours Partners in Mission working with Northwell Health Do you have a spare iPad, iPhone or similar device that you could donate to hospitalized patients who are hoping to speak to and see the faces of their loved ones?

Northwell St. Martin's Parish is organizing a virtual visitation initiative via the use of donated iPads, iPhones and other similar devices to help patients connect with their families and friends when they are hospitalized. If you have an old

device (or new!), please consider donating it for patient usage at the hospitals of Northwell Health in a program called We Care 4 Them.

If you can help, here is what we ask you to do:

- * Insure your IPHONE/IPAD has the ability to do FaceTime. Go to SETTINGS and scroll down until you see FaceTime between Messages and Maps. If you see it, it means your device can do FaceTime.
- * Sign out from your iCloud account before completing a factory reset by going to SETTINGS > Accounts & Passwords > Sign Out.
- * Erase all data on your phone. Go to SETTINGS. Then to the GENERAL tab. Click on it and scroll all the way down to RESET. Then click on ERASE ALL SETTINGS. It may ask for your password.
- * Place your donation, including charger cables, in a plastic bag. Do include your contact information. Bring your donation to St. Martin of Tours Rectory, 40 Seaman Avenue, Bethpage, and place it in the mail slot in the door.
- * We would appreciate a message at smtpartnersinmission@gmail.com so we know to expect it.
- * Donated devices will be given to Northwell Health for distribution throughout their hospital system for patients to communicate with their families.

You touch families, too. Yours are the hands that show you care.



To Jesus Through Mary

When Catholics pray to Mary they are *not* worshiping her, rather they are *honoring* her and asking for her intercession on their behalf — in fact, more than praying "to" her, we pray "with" Mary, asking her to pray with and for us. St. Louis de Montfort uses an incredible analogy of a peasant requesting a favor from a king, to explain Mary's role in our relationship with God:

It is as if a peasant, wishing to gain the friendship and benevolence of the king, went to the queen and presented her with a fruit which was his whole revenue, in order that she might present it to the king. The

queen, having accepted the poor little offering from the peasant, would place the fruit on a large and beautiful dish of gold, and so, on the peasant's behalf, would present it to the king. Then the fruit, however unworthy in itself to be a king's present, would become worthy of his majesty because of the dish of gold on which it rested and the person who presented it.

We are that peasant — sinful and broken — wishing to gain the favor of the King. Catholic Health Services teams up with Mayo Clinic for COVID-19 plasma research

Potential donors must have a prior, verified diagnosis of COVID-19, but are now symptom-free and fully recovered. In addition to being in good health, donors must also be at least 18 years of age and weigh at least 110 pounds. The plasma can be administered only to a consenting COVID-19 patient or a patient whose family member offers consent.

CATHOLIC NEWS AGENCY: RELIGIOUS AMERICANS SAY CORONAVIRUS CRISIS HAS STRENGHTENED THEIR FAITH: About 24% of Americans and about 35% of Christians told *Pew Survey* that their faith had grown stronger. However, about 47% of Americans said their faith hadn't grown much. Of all respondents, those who attended religious services at least monthly tended to say their faith had grown stronger. Among those who attended services a few times a year, 26% said their faith had become stronger. The same survey found 55% of Americans have said they prayed for an end to the pandemic, including about 68% of Catholics.

Bishops condemn Covid-related racist incidents; call for 'stronger resolve toward unity' (source: LI Catholic 5/6/2020 www.licatholic.org)

WASHINGTON — Calling reported racist incidents against Americans of Asian and Pacific Island heritage fueled by the COVID-19 virus "absolutely unacceptable," three U.S bishops released a statement May 5th expressing deep concern. Archbishop Nelson J. Pérez of Philadelphia, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee for Cultural Diversity in the Church, Bishop Oscar A. Solis of Salt Lake City, chairman of the USCCB's Subcommittee on Asian and Pacific Island Affairs, and Bishop Shelton Fabre of Houma-Thibodaux, chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism jointly issued the statement below:

"The pandemic resulting from the new coronavirus continues to sweep across the world, impacting our everyday behavior, practices, perceptions, and the way we interact with one another. While we have been heartened by the countless acts of charity and bravery that have been modeled by many, we are also alarmed to note the increase in reported incidents of bullying and verbal and physical assaults, particularly against Americans of Asian and Pacific Island heritage.

"While a high percentage of Asian Americans work in the health care sector risking their own health to save lives, some have experienced rejection and requests to be treated 'by someone else.' Way before state and local ordinances brought to a halt almost every economic sector in the country, communities across the country, from Oakland, California to New York City, reported a sharp decline in the patronage for businesses owned and operated by Asian Americans. These are only a few painful examples of the continuing harassment and racial discrimination suffered by people of Asian and Pacific Islanders and others in our country.

"As Catholic bishops, we find these actions absolutely unacceptable. We call on Catholics, fellow Christians and all people of good will to help stop all racially motivated discriminatory actions and attitudes, for they are attacks against human life and dignity and are contrary to Gospel values. As we wrote in our pastoral letter *Open Wide Our Hearts* (2018), racism is 'a failure to acknowledge another person as a brother or sister, created in the image of God.' "Our hearts go out to all those who have been victims of these vile displays of racism and xenophobia. These dreadful occurrences are a reminder that, in an environment of increased anxiety and fear, racial profiling and discrimination continue to negatively impact the lives of certain populations, adding to the pain and suffering already caused by the pandemic.

"The acts of violence and unjust discrimination evoke and prod a long history of xenophobia and racism in this country. If uncontested, they could lead once again to a normalization of violence and abuse against particular groups. It would be a tragedy for the United States to repeat this history or for any American to act as if it is appropriate to do so. "Rather, the reality of the times and all the suffering caused by this pandemic call for a stronger resolve towards unity, demonstrated through acts of solidarity, kindness and love toward one another, so that we can emerge from this crisis renewed and stronger as one American people; a people that places value in every human life, regardless of race, ethnic origin, gender or religious affiliation.

"While we continue to pray fervently for an end to the pandemic caused by the COVID-19 virus, we call for a firm rejection of racial categorizations or presumptions, racially based verbal assaults or slurs, and for an end to all forms of violence. We ask our elected officials and public institutions, as well as all public figures, to do all that they can to promote and maintain peace in our communities; and we encourage all individuals, families and congregations to assist in promoting a greater appreciation and understanding of the authentic human values and cultural contributions brought by each racial heritage in our country."

Let me describe something and see if you can guess what this is. It is fluffy and white. It is something that you can eat. You may like to eat it with butter and salt added. It is fun to eat it while watching a video. Yes, it is popcorn.



Now look at this. Describe what you see. You see popcorn? How can that be? This is not fluffy and white; it is yellow and very hard. Would it taste good with butter and salt added? No, you cannot eat it while it is in this form. When heat is applied to the kernels of corn, steam forms inside the kernel causing it to change its appearance and pop or explode into a tasty treat that we can eat.

In the Bible Jesus tells his disciples, "Believe me that I am in the Father, and the Father in me...." (14:11). This is a difficult verse for many of us to understand. How can Jesus also be God the Father? It may help to think about it in the way we see two different forms of popcorn. Both the kernels and the fluffy white popcorn we eat are both popcorn, but in two different forms. Jesus also says something else that is an important thing to remember. "Don't let your heart be troubled. Believe in God. Believe also in me" (14:1).
