The Pastor's Letter

We have reached the 50th Day of Easter - Pentecost. As I am writing this letter, we are working on



plans to slowly re-open the parish to public worship. This will be done in stages. We will soon once again have regularly scheduled times for confessions. These will likely be outdoor in a "drive-through" fashion. The completion of the construction on Seaman Avenue will determine how we can best arrange for it. Small gatherings of 10 or less are now permitted. Therefore, we are able to celebrate funeral Masses, baptisms, and weddings provided the total number in the church is 10 or less.

Families who arranged for baptisms have been contacted to reschedule. Anyone who wishes to schedule a baptism should contact us. We will be scheduling them every day of the week at any reasonable time. Online baptism preparation is available. Obviously in a parish our size we cannot again begin Sunday or weekend Masses inside the church with that restriction. However, we are looking at outdoor options (whether inside cars, bringing chairs and spacing them 6 feet out, or some combination). I have purchased a small FM transmitter so sound can broadcast to car stereos, portable radios, or smartphone apps. We are working on the logistics now. We will probably try a few different things over the next few weeks to see what works best for our situation here at SMT.

We know the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit: Wisdom, Understanding, Council, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety, and Fear of the Lord. We will need them during these days of transition back into public worship. To that list, I would add just a few more "gifts" for which we should be asking the Holy Spirit. First, for the gift of *HUMILITY*. We need to be able to put aside our own personal preferences and work together during the coming months. Things will not be ideal. There are restrictions that none of us want to have. But reality is reality, and we have to respond accordingly. Rather than focus on not having things our way, let's focus on a renewed love and appreciation for the Sacrifice of Christ on the Cross that we are graced to be present at around the altar.

Let's pray for the gift of *FLEXIBILITY*. Masses may be scheduled at different times and in different places than we are used to. It's likely we will not be able to go to "my Mass" and sit in "my seat." Once we are again allowed larger numbers in the church, it is very likely that there will be some kind of organized entrance procedure. We will have to arrive early and sit where we are guided by the ushers. Depending on what cleaning procedures are required, Mass times may change.

We should ask for the gift of *GENEROSITY*. If we have limited capacity in the church (or other space), then everyone who wants to come for Mass simply could not fit in the building. It's been very odd, and in fact painful, to spend 8 weeks coming up with creative ways to keep people from gathering. Unfortunately, even as restrictions loosen we will still need to limit capacity. In a large parish like ours, that may mean some kind of reservation system or other means of scheduling. It will only work if people are generous with each other and understanding of the situation. I think of situations in parishes where limits have to be placed on Mass intentions when the Mass book is open for fear the first 5 people in line will arrange for every Mass of the year. It's likely there will be limits in order to allow for every parishioner to attend. Whatever system is put in place, we all have to respond generously.

Above all, ask for the virtue of **HOPE**! The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines hope as "the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit."

On this Pentecost Sunday we recognize the gift of the Holy Spirit sent upon those gathered in the Upper Room and sacramentally on us through the generations. We know that we can get through the specific trials of this time because we keep our eyes focused on the Kingdom of Heaven and trust in the promises of Christ. As we have experienced many limitations over these weeks, we know that we do not have to count on our own strengths or worry about our limitations. *We have to trust in Christ!*

hat are the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit? Our confirmandi know these gifts full well. We continue to pray for them and our first communicants as they patiently await their special sacrament. In the meantime, as a refresher for the rest of us, here they are with an explanation.

THEY ARE TRADITIONALLY OUTLINED IN THE BOOK OF ISAIAH:

"The spirit of the LORD shall rest upon him: a spirit of wisdom and of understanding, a spirit of counsel and of strength, a spirit of knowledge and of fear of the LORD, and his delight shall be the fear of the LORD." – Isaiah 11:2-3

Piously considered the first and greatest of the gifts, according to Saint Bernard it is the "supernatural Gift of the Holy Spirit which enables us to know God and to rejoice in perfect love." The gift includes not only illumines the mind, but the heart as well, directing it to a purer and deeper love for God.

THE GIFT OF UNDERSTANDING

The gift of understanding differs from wisdom – the desire to contemplate the things of God – in that understanding allows us to "penetrate to the very core of revealed truths." It enables us to relate all truths to one's supernatural purpose and further illuminates our understanding of Scripture.

THE GIFT OF COUNSEL

The gift of counsel instills in us a supernatural prudence, enabling us to judge right and wrong and choose correctly what will help us in our salvation and glorifying God. "Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the road broad that leads to destruction, and those who enter through it are many. How narrow the gate and constricted the road that leads to life. And those who find it are few." – Matt 7:13-14

THE GIFT OF FORTITUDE

The gift of fortitude instills in us the courage to overcome obstacles and difficulties that come with the practice of our Faith and religious duties. Aguinas says the" principal act of fortitude is endurance, that is to stand immovable in the midst of dangers rather than to attack them."

THE GIFT OF KNOWLEDGE

The gift of knowledge enables to us to as far as humanly possible see things from God's point of view, pointing to us the path to follow and what danger to avoid in order to obtain Salvation and go to Heaven.

"For I know well the plans I have in mind for you—oracle of the LORD—plans for your welfare and not for woe, so as to give you a future of hope." – Jeremiah 29:11

THE GIFT OF PIETY

The gift of piety accords with reverence, inspiring a filial relationship with God so we may come to recognize our total reliance on Him and come before God with humility, trust, and love. Pope Francis said that piety "is not mere outward religiosity; it is that genuine religious spirit which makes us turn to the Father as his children and to grow in our love for others, seeing them as our brothers and sisters."

"I no longer call you slaves, because a slave does not know what his master is doing. I have called you friends,

because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father." – John 15:15



THE GIFT OF FEAR OF THE LORD

Commonly misunderstood as a fear of a God ready to smite us, the gift of the fear of Lord instills in us an awe and wonder at the glory and majesty of God — a fear of separating ourselves from God and offending Him as the same as a child fears offending his father. Pope Francis said that it "is no servile fear, but rather a joyful awareness of God's grandeur and a grateful realization that only in him do our hearts find true peace."

Pope Francis to lead world shrines in rosary prayer for pandemic May 30

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Pope Francis will lead the major shrines around the world in praying the rosary to implore Mary's intercession and protection amid the coronavirus pandemic.

Shrines which will participate in the rosary May 30 include the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C., and the shrines of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Our Lady of the Rosary of Chiquinquira, Our La-

dy of Lujan, and the Virgin of Milagro. From Europe, there will be the Shrines of Our Lady of Częstochowa, Our Lady of Fatima, Our Lady of Lourdes, San Giovanni Rotondo, and Our Lady of Pompei. The National Pilgrimage Centre of Elele in Nigeria and the Shrine of Our Lady of Peace in Ivory Coast will join from Africa. The Pontifical Council for Promoting the New Evangelization has been responsible for Catholic shrines since 2017.

The pope will pray at the replica of the Lourdes Grotto in the Vatican Gardens May 30, the eve of Pentecost, and will also be joined by several "men and women representing various categories of people particularly affected by the virus," the Vatican said May 26.

The service will be at 5:30 p.m. in Rome (11:30 a.m. EDT).

"At the feet of Mary, the Holy Father will place the many troubles and sorrows of humanity, further worsened by the spread of COVID-19," said a statement released by the Pontifical Council for Promoting New Evangelization. According to the statement, the prayer, which coincides with the end of the Marian month of May, "is another sign of closeness and consolation for those who, in different ways, have been struck by the coronavirus, in the certainty that the Heavenly Mother will not disregard the requests for protection."

We have a responsibility to ourselves and each other not to let our guard down or become complacent, especially now that the warmer weather and Summer is before us. Let the Gifts of the Holy Spirit include KIND-NESS toward one another as we respect the life of each and every person.

- **DISTANCING:** 6 to 10 feet apart.

THE BACKGROUND OF WHY WE CELEBRATE PENTECOST

The Jewish Perspective: Pentecost has significance both in Judaism and Christianity. In the book of Leviticus 23, God gave instructions to Israel concerning several special days, or weeks, of remembrance and celebration. These festivals were to be celebrated every year for generations to come. God described what was known as Shavuot or the Festival of Weeks. Shavuot is a major Jewish celebration held on the 6th and usually the 7th day of Sivan, fifty days after the second day of Passover. It was originally a harvest festival, but now also commemorates the giving of the Law (the Torah). Shavuot was also sometimes referred to as Pentecost, a Greek word meaning fiftieth.

The Christian Perspective: The second chapter of Acts records the coming of the promised Holy Spirit (Acts 1:4-8) at the Jewish celebration of Shavuot. Because of this Christians also celebrate Pentecost. But not as a harvest festival or a remembrance of the giving of the Law, but as the coming of the Holy Spirit. However, this is not a coincidence that God chose THIS day to send the Holy Spirit. The Shavuot was a celebration of the first fruits of the year's harvest. And, in a sense, that is what Pentecost is to Christians. Those believers in Jerusalem on that momentous day were the "first fruits" of the great harvest that was just beginning. As the Passover and Exodus were a foreshadowing of Good Friday and Easter, so the Shavuot was a foreshadowing of Pentecost.

After Jesus' ascension, his followers about 120 of them continued to meet in Jerusalem. Acts 2:1-13 records the events of this Pentecost, about 10 days after Jesus' ascension. His followers were all together when a sound like



the blowing of a mighty wind came from heaven and filled the place where they were staying. What appeared to be tongues of fire separated and rested on each of them and they were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages. A crowd had gathered to investigate the noise. These were people from all over the known world who came to celebrate Shavuot. When the apostles and disciples came out of the room they were speaking to the crowd so that each could hear what was being said in their own language. They were confused by this, but Peter explained to them that what they were experiencing was the fulfillment of the prophecy in Joel 2:28-32. A prophecy that included God pouring out his Spirit on all people. Peter then proceeded to preach his first sermon, explaining who Jesus was and the significance of what had happened to him. Then he called on them to repent and turn to Jesus for salvation. And that day, 3,000 people believed and were saved.
