

The Pastor's Letter

In an ordinary summer, this would be the time for Major League Baseball to play its All-Star Game, the Midsummer Classic. As you well know, this is no ordinary year. And so what would normally be a mid-



season break is actually the beginning of Spring Training (again). Hockey and basketball are making plans for playoff tournaments that will go into the late summer and early Fall. Football is scheduled to begin as usual, but nothing is certain. Some of you may remember the classic comedy routine of George Carlin where he discusses the differences between baseball and football. There is one difference between the two sports that I think can speak to our current situation here at Saint Martin of Tours during this very unusual year 2020.

Often when I have given presentations about parish liturgy, I have used the analogy of the differences between the fields of play in baseball and football. In football, every field is exactly the same. Whether it is Bethpage High School, Notre Dame Stadium, Metlife Stadium, or anywhere else, the field measures exactly the same. Things aren't the same for baseball. Yankee Stadium is different than Citifield. Citifield is different than Shea Stadium. The new Yankee Stadium is actually the same as the old Yankee Stadium, because one can't change the most important stadium in baseball history *too* much!

What does this have to do with liturgy or a parish? Much like the rules of baseball are the same no matter where it is played, so too the liturgy of the Church is the same no matter what parish or church it is being celebrated. It is the role of the parish to celebrate completely and fully the liturgy of the church in the environment we have. Every parish church is different but the liturgy is the same. We never change the liturgy to fit the environment, much like the rules of baseball don't change because a field has a shorter or longer distance to centerfield.

In the next few months, we are going to see some differences between parishes in how they schedule their liturgies and manage the new guidelines. We will also see that fact in how Faith Formation is structured, how offices operate, and how, when, and where groups will meet. I thank you for your continued patience and understanding as we seek to manage this crisis as best we can.

The situation of every parish is different. We all have different buildings, infrastructure, resources, staffing, etc. It is likely that between parishes we will see many different approaches to Faith Formation going into this Fall. We will be working on details over the summer, but there will be significant differences from what we have been used to in previous years.

Most of us like consistency and are hesitant about change. Yet, the reality of our situation demands these changes and leaves us with a degree of uncertainty none of us are comfortable with. However, our faith is one of hope in the future. St. Paul says as much in today's reading from his Letter to the Romans, "I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us." This is certainly a time of suffering. But as Christians we know that suffering has redemptive value, that our suffering is always in union with Jesus Christ, and leads to the hope of the future.

We will continue celebrating Sunday Mass according to the normal schedule. Our capacity has now increased to 33%. The Saturday 5pm Mass has had the most attendance, and the Sunday 5:30pm Mass has had the least attendance over these three weekends. If you are worried about facing a crowd, the 7:30am or 5:30pm Masses might be considered. Our Monday through Friday 9am Mass seems to be back to around usually "pre-Covid" attendance. Our church is being regularly sanitized but we need your help to keep it clean. Please wash or sanitize your hands before coming in and continue to wear your masks. I know this is inconvenient for everyone, but together we will get through it. Please remember that the obligation to attend Mass on Sunday remains dispensed, so please remain home if you feel uncomfortable, are sick, or are in an at-risk category.

I will be away from the parish this weekend and during the next few days, but will pray to our Lord God through the intercession of our patron, St. Martin of Tours, to keep us all safe and well.

MARIA GORETTI: The Story of the Patroness of Modern Youth

July 6 marks the feast day of St. Maria Goretti, a young virgin and martyr whose life is an example of purity and mercy for all Christians. St. Maria Goretti is best known for her commitment to purity and the courageous defense of her faith at the young age of eleven that made

her willing to undergo death rather than participate in a sin against God.

Her story is retold in this beautifully made film from Italy. It explains the plight of the poor laborers of the time, struggling to survive in a swampy area with rampant malaria and extreme poverty. Luigi and Assunta Goretti keep their faith despite the hardship, and they instill in their children a deep love for God. Their daughter Maria is especially devout. But tragedy strikes more than once: sickness and death affects the Goretti family, and then their young neighbor Alessandro does the unthinkable.

This film, made on location and filled with authentic detail, stars Martina Pinto as Maria, Flavio Insinna (Saint John Bosco) as the brave local Passionist priest, Luisa Ranieri and Massimo Bonetti as her parents, and Claudia Koll as the Countess Mazzoleni.

Without immediate action from the international community, Christians in northern Iraq could be endangered with extinction, warns a new report from the pontifical charity *Aid to the Church in Need*



(ACN). The report, <u>"Life after ISIS: New Challenges for Christianity in Iraq,</u>" is based on a survey of Christians in the liberated Ninevah Plains. With anticipated emigration, ACN says the region's Christian population could plummet to 23,000 within four years. That is a reduction of 80% from the months before the 2014 Islamic State invasion and would move the Christian community from the category of "vulnerable" to the critical category of "endangered with extinction," the report states.

"The international community must take immediate and decisive action to tackle the problems which are threatening the continuing Christian presence in Iraq," said Edward Clancy, director of outreach for Aid to the Church in Need-USA. "It is more important than ever that world leaders work together to prevent Christian numbers falling further in Iraq." ACN's survey indicates that security and political reasons remain the primary driver of emigration. According to the report, 87% of the Christians feel "unsafe or absolutely unsafe," and 67% believe it is likely or very likely that Islamic State or a similar group will return in the next five years. Of those wishing to emigrate, 69% cite political and security reasons as the primary reason.

The region also suffers from a poor economy. In the Ninevah Plains, 93% of Christians characterized the economy as bad or very bad. "The primary driver of the poor economy is the state of Iraq as a whole, which is burdened by sanctions, poor security, extreme corruption, and an unpredictable political system," the report states. In the summer of 2014, more than 100,000 Christians were uprooted from their homes by ISIS, fleeing to the Kurdistan region in northern Iraq. After the liberation of the Ninevah Plains, in early 2017 Aid to the Church in Need launched what it calls a "modern-day Marshall Plan" to tackle the "mammoth task" of rebuilding Christian homes. ACN has since helped restore 2,860 damaged or destroyed Christian homes in six cities and villages on the Ninevah Plains. It now plans to focus on rebuild the infrastructure of church-run facilities. By 2019, the number of returned displaced Christians was 36,000.

In its report, ACN suggests nongovernmental organizations, churches and governments seeking to improve the condition of Christians in Iraq should emphasize advocacy leading to the restoration of security in the Ninevah Plains. Foreign governments should exert pressure on the governments in Baghdad and Irbil, the report says. Although Islamic State has been defeated, "Christians remain subject to threats, extortion, and intimidation," the report says. "These include the threats associated with ISIS, Iran-backed militias, and the heightened risk of a regional war between the U.S. and Iran, which could play out on Iraqi soil." ACN says its surveys "continue to reveal the Iraqi Christians have a resilience not only to survive but, given more favorable conditions, to emerge from the margins to serve as an important instrument in the rebuilding of a peaceful, pluralistic and healthy society." BISHOPS' PRO-LIFE CHAIR SAYS SUPREME COURT DECISION CONTINUES PRIORITIZING ABORTION BUSINESS OVER WOMEN'S HEALTH AND SAFETY

On June 29, the Supreme Court of the United States announced its decision in an abortion case out of Louisiana, June Medical Services v. Russo. The Court ruled 5 to 4 to strike down the Louisiana law that requires abortion doctors to have hospital admitting privileges. Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City, Kansas, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee for Pro-Life Activities, issued the following statement:

"Abortion violently ends the life of a child, and often severely harms women. Abortion becomes even more destructive when basic health and safety standards are ignored, and profit margins are prioritized over women's lives. As Catholics, we condemn abortion as a grave injustice that denies the fundamental human right to life. Yet even as we seek to end the brutality of legalized abortion, we still believe that the women who seek it should not be further harmed and abused by a callous, profit-driven industry.

"The Court's failure to recognize the legitimacy of laws prioritizing women's health and safety over abortion business interests continues a cruel precedent. As we grieve this decision and the pregnant women who will be harmed by it, we continue to pray and fight for justice for mothers and children.

"We will not rest until the day when the Supreme Court corrects the grave injustice of Roe and Casey and recognizes the Constitutional right to life for unborn human beings. And we continue to ask all people of faith to pray for women seeking abortion, often under enormous pressure, that they will find alternatives that truly value them and the lives of their children." (CNA) EWTN: ANALYSIS - WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE SUPREME COURT AND ABORTION: The ruling in June Medical Services v. Russo came as a major let down for the pro-life movement in the U.S., dashing hopes that the Supreme Court would use the opportunity to strike at the foundation of legalized abortion in the country. Numerous other state laws are working their way through the court system, and any one of them could arrive at the Supreme Court in the coming months, paving the way for another major ruling. Here are three cases for Pro-Life observers to watch: 1. OHIO'S BAN ON ABORTING BABIES WITH DOWN SYNDROME; 2. TEXAS LAW PROHIBITING DILATION AND EVACUATION (D&E) ABORTIONS; AND 3. HEARTBEAT ABORTION BANS.


The Supreme Court has declined several times in the last five years to hear cases involving laws which ban abortion after a baby's heartbeat is detectible - often around six weeks into pregnancy. But if the court were to consider one of these laws, which a handful of states passed last year, it could be among the most significant rulings handed down in this generation.

U.S. CATHOLIC MEDIA MUST INSPIRE UNITY AMID DIVISION, POPE SAYS: VATICAN CITY (CNS) "Catholic media outlets in the United States are called to break down barriers that prevent dialogue and honest communication between people and communities," Pope Francis said. "The national motto 'E Pluribus Unum' (Out of Many, One) can serve as inspiration of the ideal of unity amid diversity in an age marked by conflicts and polarization from which the Catholic community itself is not immune," the pope said in a June 30 message sent to participants of the Catholic Media Conference. "The church," he added, "needs men and women of conviction who protect communication from all that would distort it or bend it to other purposes. We need media that can help people, especially the young, to distinguish good from evil, to develop sound judgments based on a clear and unbiased presentation of the facts and to understand the importance of working for justice, social concord and respect for our common home," he said.
