Despite our own changed and growing needs due to Covid, we always need to be conscious of our connection to our brothers and sisters around the world. As Catholics, we must always support the missions by our prayer and our practical support. We look forward to his visit.

Due to travel restrictions, Fr. Sylvester and his team of medical professionals and volunteers will not be able to physically journey to Nigeria this year. However, the donated supplies will be shipped to the medical facility. Thank you to all who have donated money or supplies. Donations for the medical mission are always welcome. Donations can me made to the parish with Medical Mission in the memo line. For specific supply needs, please see Fr. Sylvester.

Beginning in August, our Parish Office will be back to almost-normal operating hours. These will be posted. Our Faith Formation Office will open on Monday, August 10. The first order of business will be to plan for First Communion and Confirmation, which will take place in September and October (see below). During the month of August we will also be planning for the coming year. The focus of the program will be on Sunday and the family, as opposed to weekday and classroom. More information will be provided in the future, as well as registration details.

Registration for the new dates for First Communion and Confirmation will be made using the parish Mass reservation system (https://pastorstoolbox.com/save-a-seat/ede6e591-a5e0-57aa-af37-6448103e2de4). <u>Registration will go "live" at 5:00pm on Thursday, August 13.</u> It will be first come, first serve. This will allow every family to be properly notified and make an informed decision, as well as giving every family a fair chance to select the preferred time. As stated, we will be flexible if a family cannot make one of the new dates or is uncomfortable with a crowd. We will be able to celebrate First Communion at any weekend or weekday Mass. We can celebrate confirmation at weekend or weekday Masses as well. Confirmation will be conferred by the parish priests with permission of the bishop. This permission, which is required for the sacrament to be valid, is tied to a specific date, time, and priest. Therefore, we cannot allow for last minute changes. If a change needs to be made, new permission must be obtained from the bishop. Requests for dates and times other than the rescheduled times should be made to the Faith Formation office beginning Monday, August 17.

Our parish First Communion Masses will be Saturday, September 12 at 12pm, Saturday, September 26 at 11am and 1pm, and Saturday October 3 at 11am. Confirmation will be Monday September 28, Tuesday September 29, and Wednesday September 30 at 4pm and 7pm each day. Each celebration will be limited to 25 families. Each family will be given one reserved row. As of right now no other guests will be permitted due to capacity restrictions. We will work on live-steam options and other details as we get closer. Thank you again for your patience and understanding!

OFFICE OF HUMAN LIFE, FAMILY AND BIOETHICS: DIOCESE OF ROCKVILLE CENTRE ON CONSCIENCE & OBJECTIVE TRUTH: "Objective truth is foundational to a well-formed conscience."

Dear Friends for Life, It is with rejoicing that we finally experience the step-wise re-opening of New York and a gradual return to parish life with attendance at Mass, confession and reception of the Eucharist! At the same time there is a deep mourning for the loss of family members, friends and acquaintances whose parting from us was made all the more difficult by the restrictions under which we have all been living since March. It has been a time of suffering for everyone, whether directly or indirectly affected by the pandemic. As if this were not bad enough however, our already-grieving nation has been from a state of mandated dormancy to the extreme opposite of widespread civil unrest associated with an equal degree of distress and lamentation - over which there is no dearth of opinions. As these events unfold before us, a prudent forbearance must find consolation in the words of St. Peter, "But if you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in his footsteps." (I Peter 2:20-21). So too, St. Paul tells us, "where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more." (Romans 5:20). What better time to reflect on how we can be vessels of overflowing grace? One essential way is to better understand conscience and objective truth.

CONSCIENCE: Conscience is a rational judgment that determines an act to be right or wrong. It is the "voice of God" that speaks to every person to seek good and reject evil. It is so important that we are obligated to follow a certain conscience even if it is in error (that is, an error of which we are not aware); if there is doubt or uncertainty, we must study the issue further before deciding how to proceed. Even after the act is performed, conscience continues to work and lets us rest in a clear conscience or wrestle with a guilty conscience. Ultimately, conscience is a gift from God used to exercise our free will.

OBJECTIVE TRUTH: Now, just because you, I or anyone else sees something one way does not make that objectively true. In fact, objective truth is not based upon emotions, perspectives, or desires which are subjective and differ from one individual to the next. Rather, Objective Truth is absolute and unchanging in its essence. You can rely on it to remain the same for you, me and everyone else for all time because it is universally true. What is good is good, and what is evil is evil. Therefore, Objective Truth is fundamental to a well-formed conscience. Unfortunately, we as a society have fallen into the trap of "moral Relativism" in which subjective truth (based on an individual's personal views) has become the norm on which many decide whether something is good or evil, something we ought or ought not to do. That is, what we think becomes an imposter truth. Instead, though, it should be the other way around: that absolute truth informs what we personally think.

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT? In the last few months we have witnessed acts of extreme selflessness, extreme evil and wo much in-between. We see what happens when reason and objective truth are upheld and when they are eclipsed by subjective truth and malformed consciences. Our Office is proud to uphold and promote the objective moral truth *THAT EVERY HUMAN LIFE, CREATED IN THE IMAGE AND LIKENESS OF GOD, IS SACRED WITH AN INVIOLABLE DIGNI-TY*. This truth is immutable. It is true for each and every innocent human life for all time. The incomparable dignity and inestimable value of every human life is the justification for obedience, to the stay-at-home orders intended to protect the health and well-being of the vulnerable. It is the motivation for every first responder, officer of the law, health care worker, etc. to do his or her job with diligence. It is as much the principle behind the just condemnation of a murderous act by a depraved police officer and looter. It is the reason callous decisions that put vulnerable people at risk are criticized and why behaviors that willfully threaten the safety or deny the full humanity of others are indefensible. It is the basis for how we move forward in our lives and work to give glory to God.

It is clear that where a well-formed conscience is applied, society cooperates and thrives for the good of the community because everyone's goals are similarly aligned. When conscience hinges on a subjective paradigm of truth, suffering (often grave suffering) ensues because the individual's goal is paramount, but as one among many, inevitably these will conflict. **WITHOUT MORAL ORDER THERE CAN BE NO SOCIAL ORDER**. We have seen this firsthand and, in response, we are called to pursue earnestly our duty to continuously form our conscience properly and to advance objective moral truth in the world. Now is the time to overflow with grace!
