The Pastor's Letter



This weekend marks one year since I arrived here at Saint Martin of Tours, along with Fr. Sylvester and Fr. Vincent. I recall a conversation I had with Bishop Nelson Perez (now Archbishop of Philadelphia) a little over a year after he arrived here in Rockville Centre. He said he was having dinner with some people and the question was asked, "How has the last year been?" He responded that other than being asked to move to another diocese, becoming a bishop, and having his car run over by a tractor-trailer (he was involved in a serious accident on the LIE) it was a pretty normal year!

Normally, when a new pastor arrives in a parish with several priests, the other priests have been there a few years. Our parish faced a transition on multiple fronts (new pastor, all new priests, the change from the Redemptorists to Rockville Centre priests, the first major Mass schedule change in over a decade). To all of this, was added a global pandemic and the first complete "shutdown" of public liturgies in our lifetime. It's certainly been an interesting year! In the midst of all that is happening this year, and all that will still happen (we still have over 3 months to the election and at this point is anyone discounting another surprise?), the core of our faith and how we live our faith in this parish remains.

In the meetings of the Pastoral Council over the last year we had begun to talk about the upcoming 100th anniversary. The 100th anniversary of the parish founding and the 100th anniversary of our church dedication are a little over a year apart and form two appropriate bookends to a year-long celebration. In addition to planning for the events of a grand celebration (which we will certainly be doing over the next few years), the events of 2020 allow, or even force, us to examine just what the parish will look like when we get to the Centennial.

Over the next year all of us (clergy, staff, advisory boards, and the parish as a whole) will have to face that question. We have resumed our regular Sunday Mass schedule under capacity limits but as of yet we have not reached the limited capacity at our Masses. What will the congregation look like when the dispensation from Sunday Mass is ended? With Catholic and government schools all scrambling to make plans for the coming academic year, what will our Faith Formation program look like? Should it even be based around an academic year and classroom model? We have a lot to think about in the immediate future.

But in the midst of all of this, the faith and the sacraments remain the same. As Christians we are called to be men and women of hope. And our hope is based only in the Cross of Jesus Christ! We know that Christ is present to His Church until the end of time. So even if some details change, the essential always remains. Perhaps the grace that comes from our current crisis (crises?) is that we (SMT, the Diocese, the Church as a whole) have a chance to stop and really examine what we are doing and how it measures up to our mission. It's a chance to make sure all of our efforts are based on mission and not "maintenance."

What's our mission? About 15 or 20 years ago, "mission statements" were the popular thing. Busi-



nesses, organizations, even parishes developed long, wordy statements that were supposed to let the world know what they were about. The problem is that, with the exception of a small group, no one knew what the mission statement meant, or even said! I think Pope Benedict summed up our mission as a Church pretty nicely in three simple statements. Worship God. Teach the Faith. Serve the Poor. To my mind, those are our priori-

ties. How do we practically live them? Those are the prudential decisions we will have to make as a parish going forward.

To that end, we have been working on a new parish website, which should be unveiled in the near future. One thing we learned from the pandemic is that while a good online presence can never, and should never, replace person-to-person relationships, it is a necessity in our time. Our parish needs to revamp and update our record keeping and the new website and some new tools will enable us to do that. Over the next year or so we will ask every parishioner to update his or her information. We found over the last few months much of what we have on file is outdated. We will also have to make a transition to mostly online communication. The days of mass-mailings are over for financial, environmental, and now even health reasons. It costs a lot in printing, stationery, postage, and manpower to do a parish-wide mailing.

A parish-wide email is quick, easy, and almost free. My goal is to be able to send out a weekly parish email with an electronic copy of the bulletin, parish announcements and events, and some short faith formation material. We are also working for the capability to have registration for Faith Formation and other parish activities, donations, etc. online. We have begun to use Vanco for online stewardship. Thank you to all who have made the switch! We will have a "formal" rollout of the program when things go back to "normal."

I do want to address our parishioners who do not have a computer or any devices for electronic communication. Copies of the bulletin will be available, as it is now, in the church and rectory. I ask those that are able to get the bulletin via *My Parish App* and the website, to please leave the hard copies for those that rely on them.

Thank you to everyone for your stewardship of the parish during these difficult days! We have obviously experienced a large shortfall in collection and other revenue due to the pandemic and the closures. We will need more time to evaluate the long-term effects of that. But because of your ongoing generosity and stewardship, we are in a much better position than we could have been. Like every family, we will have to make adjustments over the coming months and years. We are in this together and we have hope.

Yesterday, August 1, was the Memorial of Saint Alphonsus Liguori. The 9am Mass was offered for the Redemptorists who ministered here for 33 years. It is my plan to make that the intention of one Mass each August 1. Tuesday, August 4, is the Memorial of Saint John Vianney, the patron of parish priests. Please pray for an increase of vocations to the priesthood *from our parish*.

Also beginning yesterday we are once again celebrating a 9am Mass on Saturday. The schedule is Monday to Saturday 9am and the regular Sunday schedule. Confessions are at 2pm on Saturday and are once again back in the confessionals in the church. In each confessional, a door (the old confessional door) has been placed between the area for the penitent and the area for the priest. Thus there will be no face to face confession.

The kneeler has also been removed and a chair remains (there is less "touching" with the chair). Penitents are to wear a mask, maintain a 6 foot distance from the confessional door and from each other on line. Penitents should sanitize hands before coming inside the confessional. The mask, hand sanitizing, a barrier, and distance should maintain the cleanliness and safety of our confessionals. Beginning the Tuesday after Labor Day we will go back to our full Mass and confession schedule.

First Communion and Confirmation information are available both on the Parish App and last week's bulletin on the parish website. The Faith Formation Office will open on Monday, August 10. At the 10am Mass next Sunday we as a parish have the privilege to baptize, receive into the Church, and confirm three new parishioners. Due to the pandemic we were not able to celebrate these Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil. Thank you to Ann Hughes and her team for all they do, especially with the constantly changing circumstances of this year!

This weekend I will be away from SMT covering another parish for a friend who for this month has to divide his time between two parishes that are miles apart.

So with all this said, remember to - Worship God! Teach the Faith! Serve the Poor!

A few other notes for Mass in the coming weeks:


- There will be no processions before or after Mass and not during the offertory.

USCCB.ORG NEWS: BISHOP CHAIRMEN CONDEMN ACTS OF VANDALISM AT CATHOLIC SITES: July 22, 2020:

WASHINGTON: Archbishop Thomas G. Wenski of Miami, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Committee (USCCB) on Religious Liberty, and Archbishop Paul S. Coakley of Oklahoma City, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Domestic Justice and Human Development, issued the following statement in response to reports of increasing incidents of church vandalism and fires:

"In the last few weeks, we have witnessed, among other things, one church rammed with a car and set on fire, as well as statues of Jesus Christ and of the Virgin Mary defaced or even beheaded. An historic mission church has also been badly damaged by fire, and the cause is still under investigation. Whether those who committed these acts were troubled individuals crying out for help or agents of hate seeking to intimidate, the attacks are signs of a society in need of healing. In those incidents where human actions are clear, the motives still are not. As we strain to understand the destruction of these holy symbols of selfless love and devotion, we pray for any who have caused it, and we remain vigilant against more of it. Our nation finds itself in an extraordinary hour of cultural conflict. The path forward must be through the compassion and understanding practiced and taught by Jesus and His Holy Mother. Let us contemplate, rather than destroy, images of these examples of God's love. Following the example of Our Lord, we respond to confusion with understanding and to hatred with love."


CATHOLIC NEWS AGENCY EWTN: POPE FRANCIS ASKS YOUNG PEOPLE TO "SEND A HUG" TO THE ELDERLY: Pope Francis asked young people to reach out to the elderly, especially those in nursing homes, to send a message of encouragement amid the loneliness of the coronavirus pandemic. "In the memory of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus, I would like to invite young people to make a gesture of tenderness towards the elderly, especially the most lonely ones in homes and residences, those who have not seen their loved ones for many months. Dear young people, each of these elderly people are your grandparents. Do not leave them alone, they are your roots." Pope Francis suggested that young people can use the "inventiveness of love" to "send a hug" to an elderly person in their community by making a phone or video call, sending a card, or making a visit when safety measures allow.

WALKING WITH MOMS IN NEED: A YEAR OF SERVICE: July 24, 2020: A one hour introductory webinar was available for anyone who wants to help local women in difficult circumstances who are pregnant or parenting young children. USCCB staff WALKING WITH MOMS IN NEED and equip participants with the tools needed to bring this year of service to their own parish community. The purpose of this initiative is to evaluate the resources the Diocese has in place already, (which we seem to have a good amount) where we are lacking, what we can build on and how we can network more efficiently with the agencies that serve women, families and children.

The goal is to create a Diocesan wide database so each parish would have access to those resources and be able to address the needs of their parishioners or those who reach out to help with a difficult pregnancy, or those in need of support. Due to the impact of COVID-19, many dioceses across the country have had to postpone their official launch of WWMIN. To account for these unforeseen challenges revised timelines have been suggested and alternate schedules for completing the Year of Service. For example, possibly beginning October 2020 for Respect Life Month or beginning January 2021.

Please continue to check on neighbors, grandparents, or those most vulnerable during this coronavirus pandemic. Thankfully, the numbers of those infected have decreased in New York, and many businesses, stores and restaurants are open, but for those most vulnerable, it may be still difficult and in need of help.
